Teacher's Notes



Level: Intermediate

Description: Accept or except? Advice or advise? Seeing as even *native* speakers often get these tricky words mixed up, one can imagine just how baffling our poor students must find them! And if they aren't enough to send them into throes of despair, what about those perplexing verb duos, often accounted for with just one verb in their own language, where the difference in meaning is so very fine that we start to question it ourselves? The exercises in this activity sheet help to familiarise students with some of the most Confusing Words in the English language, offering them fun and varied practice, both alone and with a partner.

Aim: To practise Confusing Words though a series of written and communicative exercises.

Procedure: Give each student a copy of the two-page activity sheet.

Exercise A: Students begin by matching the verbs with their definitions.
